2015 Washington Youth Tour Delegates

Blue Ridge Mountain EMC (BRMEMC) is pleased to sponsor three local high school students each year as delegates on the Washington Youth Tour. In June, electric membership cooperatives (EMCs) in Georgia will commemorate 50 years of supporting students and teaching life lessons during the weeklong adventure that transforms young people's lives.

Shea Underwood, of Towns County, Ga.; Madeline Walker, of Union County, Ga.; and Collin Worley, of Clay County, N.C., were selected to represent BRMEMC on the Youth Tour this year. We appreciate the high school counselors who administer the selection process and work diligently to provide us with wonderful students.

Our delegates will be part of Georgia's largest contingent to date—111 students representing 155 counties in Georgia. Scheduled this year from June 11-18, the Youth Tour stands as Georgia's oldest leadership program for teens and offers students personal lessons in

U.S. history, activities encouraging leadership and teamwork, conversations with elected leaders on important subjects and current events, and a greater appreciation for community and public service.

Paying tribute to those whose vision and sacrifice secured a free and open society is another key component of the tour. To that end, the participants will visit historic landmarks in and around the nation's capital, including Arlington National Cemetery, the Smithsonian Institution museums, Holocaust Memorial Museum, Mount Vernon, Supreme Court, U.S. Capitol, Washington Monument and the MLK, FDR, Jefferson, World War II and Lincoln memorials.

BRMEMC is thrilled to have our students participate in the Washington Youth Tour, inspired by former President Lyndon Johnson who, as a U.S. senator in 1957, encouraged electric cooperatives "to send youngsters to the nation's capital, where they can actually see what the flag stands for and represents."

Washington Youth Tour: 50 years of enriching Georgia teens

hen a dozen high school students, sponsored by three electric cooperatives, took a trip from rural Georgia to the White House Rose Garden in 1965, little did they know it would mark the start of a youth leadership program that has spanned 50 years.

Those 12 teens, primarily high school juniors, were awarded an all-expenses-paid trip to Washington, D.C., after competing in an essay contest. The program was designed to give students a personal understanding of American history and their role as citizens.

The group left Sunday, June 6, 1965, from Savannah and traveled by train. They and nearly 600 teens from 17 states spent four days in our nation's capital. The highlight of the trip? An invitation from President Lyndon Johnson to a Rose Garden reception at the White House.

They also met with U.S. senators and representatives; visited historic places, such as Mount Vernon, the Washington Monument, the Jefferson Memorial and the National Archives; explored the Smithsonian Institution museums; cruised with delegates from other states on the Potomac River; and toured the U.S. Capitol, where they watched the Senate in session from the gallery.

the youth leadership experience. Georgia's delegation will fly from Atlanta to Washington, D.C., where they will join nearly 1,600 teens from 43 states participating in the national event.

This year's tour spans a full week (June 11-18) and includes many of the same stops, as well as new ones like the Martin Luther King Jr., Viet-

nam Veterans, Korean War Veterans and National World War II memorials. This year, for the first time, the group will visit the new American Veterans Disabled for Life Memorial.

What about a Rose Garden reception, you say? Well, that opportunity has been offered only a few other times by presidents—including Georgia's Jimmy Carter. But Johnson—who, as a U.S. senator in 1957, encouraged the nation's electric cooperatives to send students to Washington to "see what the flag stands for and represents"—would no doubt be pleased to know that this national leadership experience has enhanced thousands of Georgians' lives.
