Tour outstanding local students have been selected to participate in the 52nd annual Washington Youth Tour (WYT). The once-in-a-lifetime leadership experience, set for June 8-15, is sponsored by electric membership cooperatives (EMCs) in Georgia. Our delegates will see the sights of D.C. while surrounded by other ambitious high school students from across the state during the weeklong adventure.

Abby Carder of Cherokee County, N.C.; Jacquelyn Stewart, of Clay County, N.C.; Emmi Schakat, of Union County, Ga.; and Chase Williams, of Towns County, Ga., were chosen to represent Blue Ridge Mountain EMC (BRMEMC) on the 2017 Youth Tour. We appreciate the suppport of our local high school counselors, who administer the selection process.

The WYT was established to inspire the next generation of leaders. Each year, the teen delegates are

challenged to consider the role they play in their local community, as well as the world.

Delegates will explore government on a local and national level, beginning at the kickoff banquet in Atlanta before departing for Washington, D.C., the next day. Once in the nation's capital, delegates visit historic landmarks including Arlington National Cemetery, the Smithsonian Institution museums, Holocaust Memorial Museum, Mount Vernon, Supreme Court, U.S. Capitol, National Archives and the MLK, FDR, Jefferson, World War II and Lincoln memorials. In addition, participants will have the opportunity to meet with their elected officials and discuss current political issues.

Chase Williams



I et me start this column by saying just how blessed I am to live in such a beautiful area and to work with such fine people. From the Board of Directors and throughout every department at Blue Ridge Mountain EMC (BRMEMC), we are fortunate to have such a dedicated group of individuals working tire-

lessly to make sure the power stays on, the rates stay competitive and the service provided to the membership is of great value.

At BRMEMC, we are committed to providing the absolute best possible service to you, our member. Electricity and broadband service may be the products, but without great service, the products do not add the perceived value that they might otherwise. I have heard directly from several members this past year concerning our service, both the good and the bad. I want our members to know that I appreciate their candid feedback.

In an effort to improve service, we have made personnel

adjustments in the Call Center to ensure more members can get through and be assisted in a timely manner when the need arises. Based on the review of our call logs, there appears to be a substantial increase in the number of calls handled immediately instead of being pushed to voicemail or abandoned by the caller. This may seem minor, but I can assure you that the reaction of a member we speak to immediately versus a member waiting on hold for

15 minutes or more is significantly different.

In addition, I am pleased to report that our first Member Satisfaction Survey provided us with valuable information concerning the service we offer. As you might recall from my last Manager's Message in January, we conducted a phone survey of members to bet-

ter understand their satisfaction levels. In regard to BRMEMC and the service it offers, members have a current overall satisfaction level of 8.71 on a scale of 1-10, with the highest marks coming in providing reliable service and restoration of power during outages. These results are a testament to the great team working at your EMC.

The industry benchmark for overall satisfaction for rural electric cooperatives is 8.88. Although we landed a bit below that, the information collected will help us improve by providing a clearer target.

In closing, your EMC and its employees are here to serve

and will remain focused on providing the highest level of service to our members. You can rest assured our commitment is not just lip service. This starts at the top, and that is why I always make myself available to you, our members.
